Classroom Corner

MATH: Each day your child will receive a math assignment. Please check your child's classroom calendar to stay informed on what lesson your child is completing.

SOCIAL STUDIES: Students will continue to understand the differences between GPS and GIS and how these tools assist geographers and scientists. Additionally, students will learn how to read and analyze a climograph.

SCIENCE: Students will continue the ecosystems unit of study. The unit consists of an understanding of concepts, such as biodiversity, biotic and abiotic factors, consumers, producers, decomposers, symbiosis, predators and prey. Students begin the unit by completing a Pond Inquiry and Investigation, specifically focusing on the role of macroinvertebrates to a wetland ecosystem.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS: We will continue reading aloud *Wonder*. Students will begin the novel study, <u>Hatchet</u>, by Gary Paulsen. As a class we will read and discuss each chapter. Students are expected to respond in writing for each day's reading to check for understanding and comprehension of the text.
